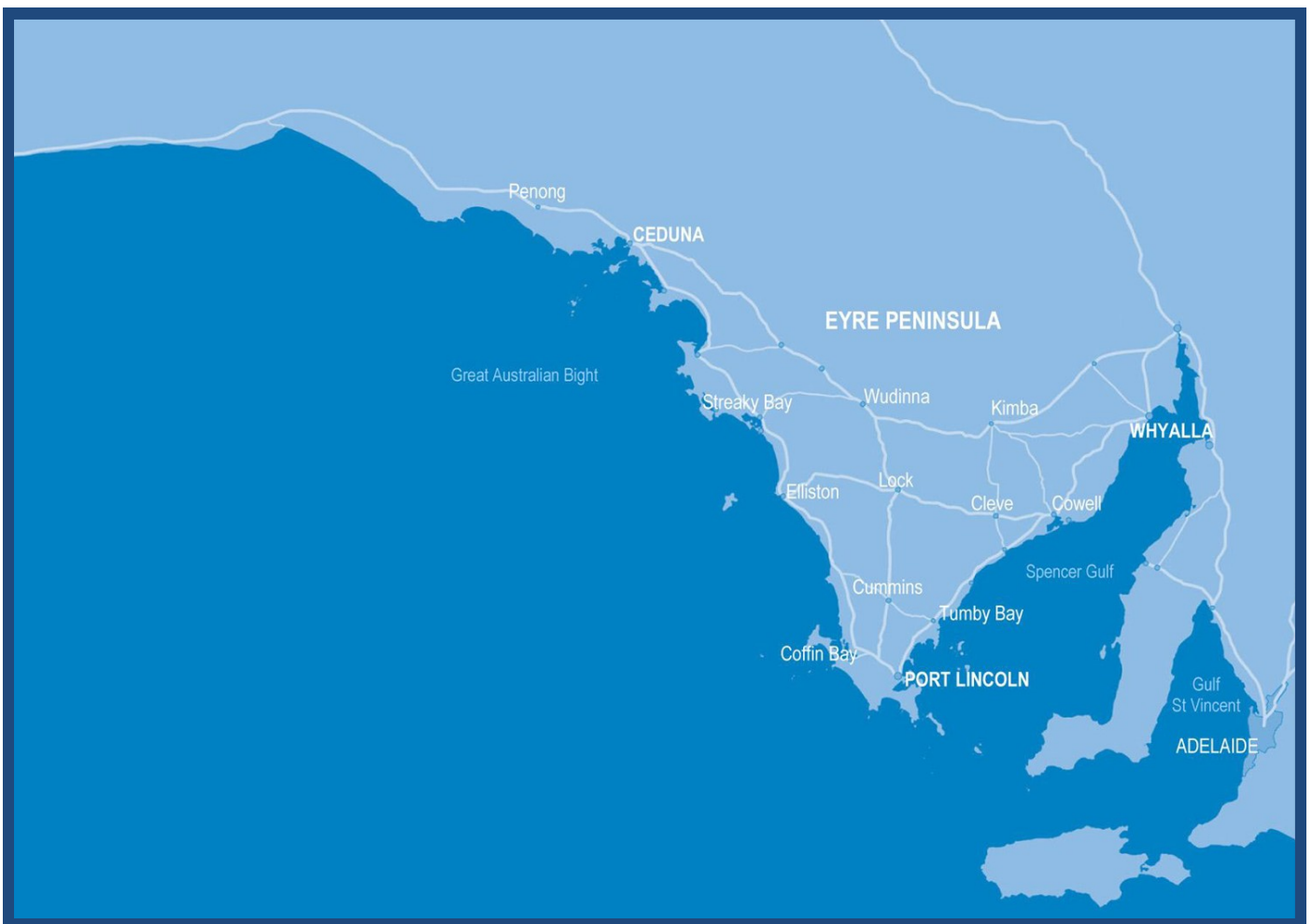

Peter Treloar MP—Patron

Born and raised on a farm near Cummins, Peter Treloar MP is a fierce and devoted advocate for the Eyre Peninsula. Peter went straight into agriculture after finishing school (at Cummins Area School and Prince Alfred College) where he enjoyed a long and rewarding career. From this he has a particular understanding of small business and the pressures the sector experiences.

Peter believes that the natural environment underpins our communities. On Eyre Peninsula the issue of water security is forefront, and one of his first achievements as an MP was to instigate, through Parliament's Natural Resources Committee, an enquiry into the Eyre Peninsula Water Supply.

His leadership on a variety of industry boards, including Primary Producers SA, Grains Council, Nuffield Australia and EPNRM, has provided him with strong skills in mediating between government and industry groups.

Peter was awarded a Nuffield Scholarship in 2002, enabling him to travel extensively and research value-adding opportunities for Australian grain, and grain industry structures.

Peter has held a variety of roles during his time as the Member for Flinders, including being the Shadow Minister for Emergency Services, Veterans Affairs and Volunteers, Leader of the Opposition's Parliamentary Secretary, Shadow Cabinet Secretary and Opposition Whip. He is currently the Deputy Speaker and Chair of Committees with the current State Government, a role he is relishing.

While he is member of various government and volunteer organisations, he is the patron of the Cummins Show, W&CH Auxiliary Port Lincoln branch, Mentoring EP and the Mortlock Shield, to name a few.

Peter and wife Annette reside on the family farm at Edillilie.

Director from October 2009 till November 2017

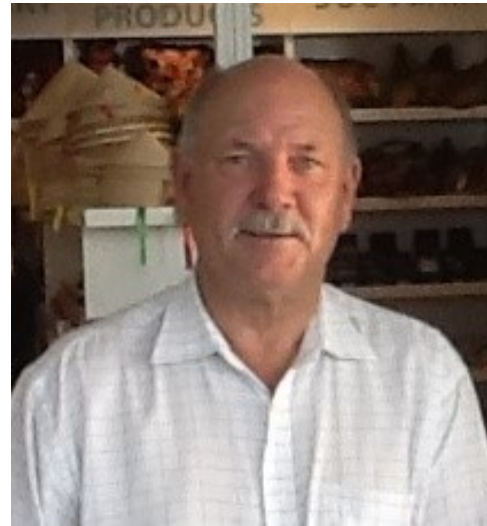

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CHAIR REPORT 2019/20

After being honoured with the Chairperson's position in March 2020 from the impressive Majella Mrdjen I present my AGM report.

In common with our regional community and the remainder of SA and further afield we have been challenged with the Covid-19 pandemic. Thankfully, the impact generally on Eyre Peninsula and on the Foundation has been modest compared to others however there have been implications.

In consultation with our valued Book Bazaar volunteers, supported strongly by Directors Peter and Maggie Knife, we temporarily closed the BB to protect our volunteers, their family and the public until we were able to instigate safe operating protocols and procedures in line with Government requirements, and reopened on 25th May to rousing sales. Understandably our turnover and consequent profits have taken a hit as detailed in the financial results.

This year has seen 2 new Directors join the board adding exceptional skills and experience and this is reflected in our recent Annual Strategic Review which has identified our areas of strength and areas of focus. We were able to highlight our ongoing programs as detailed below and also considered newer programs such as our National Growers Registration card to attract funds from our farmers and our Bequest program which has the potential to be a primary long term source of funds to grow our Corpus.

Engagement with the Vital Signs initiative with the Wyatt Trust as partner will assist the Foundation gain insight into the socio demographic map of Eyre Peninsula communities and our understanding of the region.

Of importance to me is our need to focus on growing our Corpus. With shrinking interest rates and lower dividends from our corpus impacting on the level of funds available for distribution through our Community Grants program, growth of the Corpus remains our 'core' business.

Our programs include the Eyre Peninsula Home Hospice Service, with over 40 families supported. Our partnership with Matthew Flinders Home and their ongoing partnership with Community Health SA in making the Eyre Peninsula Home Hospice work is unique and amazing and provides an invaluable support to community members in challenging times. The role of the Book Bazaar and our wonderful volunteers is crucial in the success of the Home Hospice and the Board is grateful for their commitment. Back to School Vouchers, Education Scholarships and Community Grants distributed across EP to support volunteer organisations.

I acknowledge our memberships with Australian Community Philanthropy, Philanthropy Australia and Volunteering SA/NT and access to their information sessions to assist expand our knowledge and expertise to assist our future growth.

I also acknowledge and thank especially our partnerships with Cameron Foster of Horizon Advisory, Bendigo Bank, Foundation of Rural and Regional Renewal, Wyatt Trust, Beyond Bank, RSM, Port Lincoln Rotary and the staff of the Regional Development Australia Eyre Peninsula for their ongoing generous support.

Special thanks also go to our local media, ABC Eyre Peninsula, 7 Spencer Gulf News, 5CC and Magic 89.9 FM, Port Lincoln Times, Whyalla News and Port Lincoln News Online for their continuing support with our media releases. One of our goals is to continue to promote and gain more public awareness. We have a lot to celebrate and the more community members who know about us.

We look forward to the continuing support of our patrons, Peter Treloar MP and Tony Irvine, ambassadors, Marie Lally AM and Glenn Karutz as they continue to promote, advocate and guide the Foundation.

Special thanks to the wonderful Susan Hooker, for her valued support, professionalism and commitment in keeping us on track and organised. The Foundation would not be the same without her.

In closing, my profound thanks and appreciation to our board members who have stepped up to the mark in making sure the Foundation meets its objectives. And the good news, the best is still to come.

NAMED FUNDS 2019/20



The Rotary Club of Port Lincoln established the Port Lincoln Rotary Disaster Fund with a contribution of \$25,000 in March 2012. This is to support a whole of region disaster response or preparedness associated with bushfire.

THEMED FUNDS 2019/20

The Eyre Peninsula Home Hospice Fund was established in 2013

Permanent Home Hospice Service for Eyre Peninsula Continues

A Memorandum of Understanding was re-signed in 2020 between the Eyre Peninsula Community Foundation (EPCF) and Matthew Flinders Homes (MFH). This partnership establishes a permanent Home Hospice Service on Eyre Peninsula, providing out of hours and weekend support to terminally ill patients to allow them to remain in their own homes for their last few weeks.

The Eyre Peninsula Community Foundation managed and invested the funds donated for the home hospice trial, and continues to fill that role for the permanent service. MFH provide the "front line" services under the guidance of an oversight team of associated professionals, with representatives from the EPCF and MFH Boards.

SUB-FUNDS INFORMATION

Sub-Funds can be established by donors in either the EPCF Trust or EPCF General Fund depending on whether a tax deduction is being claimed. Sub-Funds can be Named and/or Themed Funds.

Donations are invested with other trust funds, but grants made from the donations are acknowledged as being made by the Named or Themed Fund. The original donation is never spent, but keeps on giving to the community long after the money or asset was donated.

NAMED FUNDS

A Named Fund is a special sub-fund that carries a name for the purpose of honouring someone or something and preserving their memory. The sub-fund can carry the name of the donor, the donor's family, a family member, a friend, a local pioneer, an outstanding citizen or an organisation.

A Named Fund with the Eyre Peninsula Community Foundation is a cost-effective alternative to a Private Ancillary Fund (PAF) set up by the donor as defined under Australian Taxation law.

In a Named Fund:

Funds are referenced and acknowledged in the name specified by the donor.

The fund is named when the first donation is received.

The minimum contribution can be made over a period of years.*

Donors may if they wish participate in some aspects of sub-fund management (*see Sub-Fund Advisory Committees information below*).

Ongoing contributions, whilst not essential, are recommended at least for a few years.

Donations to the fund are tax deductible in some circumstances.**

Named Fund donors are able to be involved in presenting grants from the fund if they wish.

The Named Fund continues in perpetuity, even after the donor's passing.

Donors may also indicate a preference that a particular group or type of eligible project is to benefit from their donation by including a theme (*see Themed Funds*).

THEMED FUNDS

A Themed Fund is established for the purpose of directing grants into a specific area of community need as preferred by the donor (typical examples of themes include education, home hospice and sporting facilities).

The Foundation may already have a Themed Fund set up for the donor's desired theme. In that case donations may be made to the existing fund and the minimum contribution requirements do not apply to the new donor.

Donations to Themed Funds are invested with other trust funds, but grants made from the donation are acknowledged as being made from the Themed Fund.

In a Themed Fund:

The fund has a theme title which is used when grants are made from the fund.

The minimum contribution can be made over a period of years.***

Donors may if they wish participate in some aspects of sub-fund management (*see Sub-Fund Advisory Committees information below*).

Ongoing contributions, whilst not essential, are recommended at least for a few years.

Donations to the fund are tax deductible in some circumstances.**

The Themed Fund continues in perpetuity, even after the donor's passing.

SUB-FUND ADVISORY COMMITTEES

Donors who create Named or Themed Funds may establish Advisory Committees for their funds (which may comprise the donor alone or several persons appointed by the donor) to work on various aspects of sub-fund management, from establishing grant making guidelines and encouraging donations through to identifying, assessing and choosing grant opportunities. Advisory Committees may provide advice to the Trustee and make suggestions regarding the distribution of grants from sub-funds; however donors and Advisory Committees need to be mindful of the legislative restrictions that apply to charitable trusts – i.e. grant-making decisions must always remain within the discretion of the Trustee.

SUB-FUNDS POLICY

The Board will review sub-funds with a balance of less than \$20,000 annually. If the EPCF has received no donations or communication in relation to a sub-fund for a two year period the trustee may decide to meet with the donor to ascertain their intentions with a view to the funds being rolled into the Trust or General Fund and being made available for EPCF funding priorities as the Trustee decides.

A donor can also request the closure of a sub-fund and granting of the balance. Sub-funds with balances under \$20,000 will be encouraged to distribute the balance to the Trust or General Fund.

We are happy to discuss this or any other options with you confidentially and totally obligation free.

** The minimum contribution to a Named Fund is \$50,000 with an initial donation of \$10,000 and the balance to be received within five years.*

*** Where tax deductible gifts are received, conditions can apply limiting certain grant options. Bequests (gifts of money or property made under a will) are not tax deductible.*

**** The minimum contribution to a Themed Fund is \$50,000 with an initial donation of \$5,000 building to \$20,000 within 3 years and the balance to be received within five years.*

HOW TO SUPPORT THE FOUNDATION

BEQUESTS

Make a bequest to EPCF in your will. It can be acknowledged or anonymous.

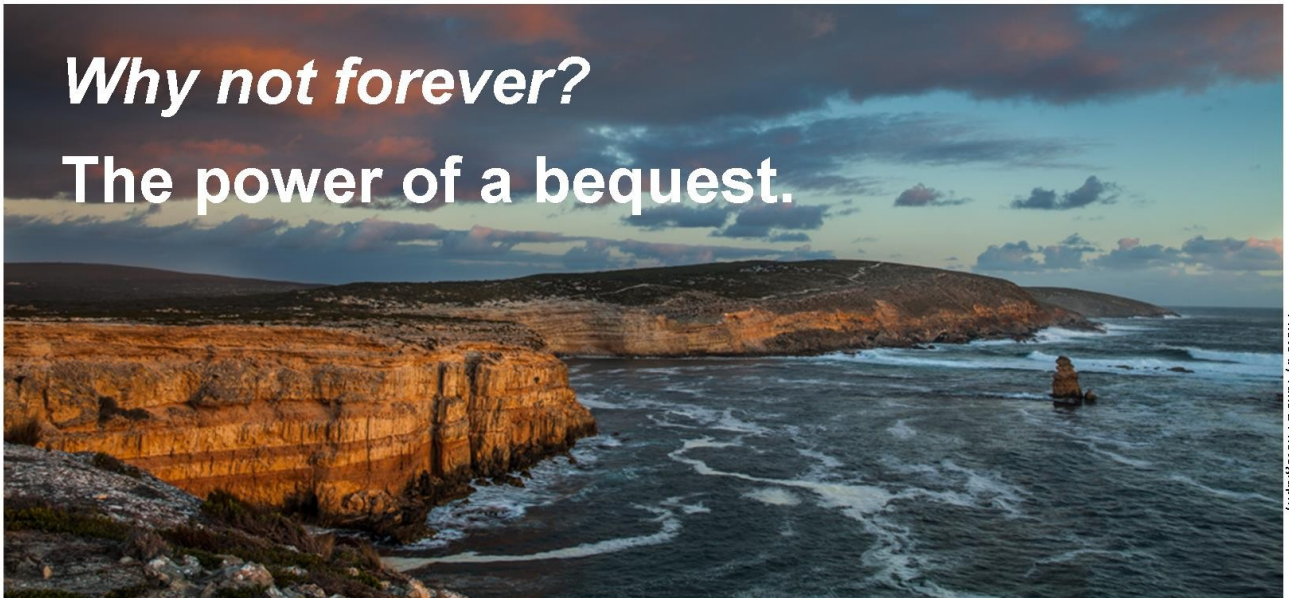

Back to School Vouchers February 2020

Eyre Peninsula Community Foundation Directors distributed Back to School Vouchers around the Eyre Peninsula. The total value for 2020 was \$19,000. Sponsorship of \$1,000 from the Port Lincoln Community Bank assisted with Matched Funding to assist school areas in drought on the Eyre Peninsula. The Eyre Peninsula Community Foundation, in conjunction with the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR); have assisted the Eyre Peninsula with Back to School Vouchers to date valued at \$200,000. Each voucher is a Target Card for \$50 which helps families in need to be able to purchase items for their school aged children to assist them starting the new school year. Vouchers are commonly used by families to buy clothing, footwear, school bags, stationery items and other equipment students' use at school. The need for this support across the Eyre Peninsula is strikingly high. TREASURER'S REPORT 2019/20

Total funds under management at year end amounted to \$521,867 (last year \$562,038).

Assets held at year end were:

Cash and bank accounts \$36,140

Bank Term deposits \$270,863

Listed shares \$214,864

Shares performance was mixed during the year, but our holding did generate \$10,881 in dividends. These investments are in blue chip shares and exchange traded funds and are held long term to provide income for distribution, however the steady erosion of interest rates has resulted in a challenging investment environment and lower returns on term deposits. In early 2019 the Board engaged a licensed Financial Advisor to assist in preparation of an investment strategy, and the changes related to that strategy (including a re-weighting of our share investments relative to term deposits) were implemented in the 2019/20 financial year.

The main income and expense items for the year were:

Donations received \$28,223, including a single \$10,000 donation to Home Hospice

Investment income \$16,381

Book Bazaar profit after expenses \$31,776

Grants made for Home Hospice services \$45,665

Other grants made \$16,409

Running costs (salaries/audit fees etc.) \$32,758

The Foundation has five Named and Themed sub-funds, with final balances as follows:

Cummins Community Future Fund \$52,199

Port Lincoln Rotary Disaster Fund \$26,225

EP Home Hospice Fund \$143,529

Palliative Care Support Fund \$6,852

Education Fund \$19,034

The Home Hospice service continues its important and much-appreciated role in the community, operating under our agreement with Matthew Flinders Homes Inc. The Book Bazaar continues to be a significant source of our funding, thanks to a very dedicated team of over 40 volunteers. The Covid-19 pandemic resulted in closure of the Book Bazaar for nine weeks, but since then sales have been well above average – people have rediscovered the joy of reading!

The increase in administration costs this year were one-off items which will not recur.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2020

1. Statement of Accounting Policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial requirements of the Association Incorporation Act (SA). The committee has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis (except for income derived from donations, which are recognised on receipt) and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuation of non-current assets.

(a) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(b) Revenue and Other Income

Interest revenue is recognised as it accrues in the profit or loss, using the effective interest rate method.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds which is at the time of receipt.

(c) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The Foundation has GST concession status and is currently not registered for GST. All revenue, expenses and assets are recognised inclusive of the amount of GST and this amount is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office.

(d) Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the Foundation from the time the asset is held ready for use.

(e) Income Tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under Section 50 (5) of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

On the basis that the Association is endorsed for charity tax concessions, no taxation has been paid since incorporation nor is there likely to be any tax payable in respect of the 2020 financial year, and the Committee do not expect the status of the Foundation to change in this regard and accordingly no provision has been made.

(f) Tax Concessions and Endorsements

The Eyre Peninsula Community Foundation Inc acts as trustee for three independent trusts that hold tax concessions and endorsements in their own right as detailed below:

The Eyre Peninsula Community Foundation Trust is a separate trust. Its income is exempt from income tax and it is a Charitable Fund. The trustee is endorsed as a Deductible Gift Recipient.

The Eyre Peninsula Disaster Fund is also a separate Trust, designed for the relief of persons in Australia who are in necessitous circumstances. The trust is also endorsed as a Deductible Gift Recipient.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2020

1. Statement of Accounting Policies (cont)

(f) Tax Concessions and Endorsements (cont)

The General Fund is also a separate Trust. Its income is exempt from income tax, but gifts made to this Fund are not tax deductible. Grants can be made for charitable purposes without being restricted to tax deductible recipients, as is the case with the Foundation Trust.

(g) Indemnification

The Foundation is entitled to be indemnified in respect of liabilities, out of the assets of the Eyre Peninsula Community Foundation Trust, Eyre Peninsula Disaster Fund and the Eyre Peninsula Community Foundation General Fund.

(h) In Kind Donations

‘Donations of fixed assets’

All assets donated to the Association are initially recorded at fair value at the date of the acquisition, being the estimated net realisable value of the assets at the date the assets are donated to the Association.

This value is recognised as a donation in the Income Statement.

‘Donations of goods and services

Donations of goods and services occur from time to time. These are recorded as donations with an equal amount being recorded as an expense in the Income Statement.

(i) Standards Issued not Adopted

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted by the incorporated association for the annual reporting period ended 30 June 2020. The incorporated association has not yet assessed the impact of these new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report. Comparative information is reclassified where appropriate to enhance comparability.

(a) Cash and Cash Equivalentents

Cash and cash equivalentents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(b) Revenue and Other Income

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds which is generally at the time of receipt.

Interest revenue is recognised as it accrues in the profit or loss, using the effective interest rate method.

(c) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The Fund has GST concession status and is currently not registered for GST. All revenue, expenses and assets are recognised inclusive of the amount of GST and this amount is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office.

(d) Tax Concessions and Endorsements

The General Fund is a separate Trust. Its income is exempt from income tax, but gifts made to this Fund are not tax deductible. Grants can be made for charitable purposes without being restricted to tax deductible recipients.

(e) Income Tax
